Kazan tours continue

For many, Monday is the beginning of the working week, but for those at the XXVIII International Olympiad in Informatics, it signalled a break.

Contestants and everyone else at the Olympiad used their downtime with a purpose: they were taken on a bus tour of some of Kazan's sports facilities, as well as on a walk along the waterfront from the Farmers' Palace to the Kazan National Cultural Centre.

During the tour, guests were told about the various international competitions to have been held in Kazan, such as the XXVII Summer

Universiade in 2013 and the XVI FINA Aquatics Championship in 2015. Kazan will of course play host to several matches in the 2018 FIFA World Cup.

Kazan is considered to be the sports capital of Russia: the city is home to sports clubs competing in the top divisions of their respective disciplines and often highly decorated. Guests heard about AK Bars hockey club, Rubin Kazan football club, Uniks basketball club and other successful Kazan-based teams. In terms of public access to sport, guests were told all about the Tennis Academy, Badminton Centre, Wrestling Palace and Kazan-Arena football stadium, as well as a wealth of other sporting facilities.

The bus tour ended beside the Farmers' Palace, at which point guests were taken on a rather long walk along the Kremlin waterfront.

The day's exploring left guests delighted. "Everything's great here!" enthused Nigerian contestant Tanitoluwa Adebayo. "Great sport, and you can play it in modern, beautiful buildings which have everything you need. And the waterfront was lovely – so clean and beautiful! The bicycle-taxis – those are for locals and tourists, yeah? Wonderful – you can ride and relax at the same time."

IOI competitors were treated to a pleasant surprise – on 14 August they could witness Sabantui, the traditional Tatar harvest festival. The holiday is held once a year in summer in Tatarstan and some other regions. Our guests reacted in different ways to this closer look at Tatar culture.



Liran Markin, Israel: “We have such holidays in our country where we put on national costumes and hold different contests. This holiday seemed more colourful to me, and I saw a mixture of Russian and Tatar culture. The most memorable competition was the one where you submerge your head into water and have to get an apple with your teeth. Now I have an apple” (shows the apple).

General Assembly meeting takes place

Today, 15 August, the General Assembly (GA) was attended by 81 team leaders, 73 deputy team leaders, 3 HSC members, 12 IC members, 7 ISC members and 8 ITC members. The main function of the GA is to decide on issues not provided for in the official regulations and decide on proposals made by the IC, as well as approve the budget for the forthcoming year. The team leader of every participant country has the right to vote at the GA.

Tradition

A sound mind in a sound body

Tatarstan's inhabitants are known for their active lifestyles and love for their traditional sports.



Some sports are native to both Russia and Tatarstan, such as weightlifting, sack-races and climbing a pole to reach a prize at the top. Women also had their own competitions, for example



competitions while carrying two buckets of water on a yoke, where the winner had not just to run quickly, but also not spill the water. Wrestling is also held in high esteem by Russians and Tatars alike: the former preferring fist-fighting similar to boxing, while the latter practiced *kuresh*, where the object is to throw your opponent using the belt around their waist.



Russians also enjoyed *gorodki*, a sort of cross between skittles and horseshoes where the



pins are arranged in various shapes and must be knocked down by throwing a bat at them, and *lapta*, a game very similar to baseball. Tatars meanwhile had something akin to pillow-fighting, where both contestants sit on a high log and attempt to disseat each other with sacks of hay, and "Smash the bag", where participants must split open a bag on the floor with a long stick while blindfolded. This of course is just a taster – both places boast a wealth of traditional sports and games which help develop strength, agility and daring.

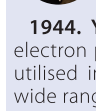

Kazan University: our greatest discoveries



1893, 1914. Chemist **Flavian Flavitsky** (1848-1917) creates both the hydrate and the chemical theory of solutions. He founded a school of inorganic chemistry and invented a "pocket laboratory" for fieldwork.



1944. **Yevgeny Zavoisky** (1907-1976) discovers electron paramagnetic resonance, now successfully utilised in fundamental and applied research in a wide range of scientific fields.



1952. **Semyon Altshuller** (1911-1983) discovers the hyperfine structure of paramagnetic resonance spectra, and in 1952 sets forth the theoretical prediction of acoustic resonance, with it creating a new branch of physics: quantum acoustics.
